Since the close of our Reunion, I have received a letter from the 4th Infantry Division, who apparently received or saw some of our literature in regard to our Reunion. They have an idea that the key members of the various veterans' associations ought to get together for the purpose of exchanging ideas. I find their letter rather interesting, especially in view of the fact that at our final meeting, a telegram was sent to the President of the United States which read as follows:

"By resolution duly adopted, your authority as our Commander in Chief of the Armed Forces is approved, and we extend to you all support and wish you success. We request that you as President and Commander in Chief of the Armed Forces of the U.S.A. immediately take all action necessary to bring the War in Viet Nam to a successful, prompt and victorious conclusion, using all means available.'

Since I have spent part of last year writing about my own opinion in regard to the Vietnam problem, I appreciated the passage of the resolution to send the telegram to the President. I think perhaps it might be worthwhile to pursue the idea presented by the 4th Infantry Division, because I still feel that the voice of the veteran should be heard in military matters. I have referred their letter to Larry Redmond for answer and any action he may deem necessary or worthwhile.

The fact that this resolution was passed and the telegram sent during my tenure of office has brought my year as President of your organization to a most successful conclusion.

Past President's Letter Do not let that which we did as a group on August 21st in addressing the foregoing telegram to the President remain silent for the next year. Each one of you should be heard so that America knows there is a group of fighting men who don't believe in those theorems of government proposed by the beatniks and peaceniks. We should let America know how we feel-that when America is engaged in a war, there can only be one conclusion and one result which must be obtained: a full victory with no quarter asked.

> I have enjoyed every moment that I was able to serve you as President, and want to take this opportunity of extending to your new officers my sincere wishes for success his coming year in their efforts to bring our Association to a fulfillment of our hoes of enlarging our Membership and letting everyone in this wonderful country know of our aims and purposes.

Philadelphia's distinguished heritage of history is written in the birth of the Nation—in the immortal words of the Declaration of Independence, in the guarantees of liberty and self-government inscribed in the Constitution of the United States, in the deeds of great and courageous men who pledged their lives and their sacred honor to the cause of freedom.

It is written, too, in the story of Betsy Ross and the events that gave birth to

the American Flag.

A memorable footnote to the proud tradition of Philadelphia was added on Sunday afternoon at Connie Mack Stadium when 12-year-old Diane De Marco, of 1911 South Hemberger St., streaked bareheaded across the playing field, from her seat in the stands, to the flagpole in center field, and brought Old Glory down to safety singlehandedly as a violent cloudburst unleashed its drenching fury and sent players and fans scurrying for cover.

Unmindful of the soaking, disregarding the roaring thunder and the crackling of lightning, unconcerned about anything at that particular moment but rescuieg The Stars and Stripes, Diane carefully folded the Flag and ran, with it firmly clenched in her arms, to the Phillies' dugout.

The eighth-grade schoolgirl's explanation was simplicity itself: "I thought it was a darned shame to let the Flag get

wet."

Betsy Ross and Diane De Marco are a cut of the same cloth. The spontaneity of

Miss De Marco's wonderful gesture made it all the more to be cherished and remembered.

Kenton Dinner Will Mark State Kick-off for Medal of Honor Winners

A dinner will be held at the Kenton Elks lodge at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 31 to kick-off a state-wide fund-raising project to honor the memory of Congressional Medal of Honor Winners.

Money raised through the fund drive will be used for the development of an "Onio Acre" at the Congressional Medal of Honor Grove, The Freedoms Founda-

tions, Valley Forge, Penn.

The Freedoms Foundation is in the process of landscaping a 50-acre wooded tract of land at Valley Forge. Each state is being alloted one acre on which a monument, benches, paths and markers will be provided honoring every Congressional Medal of Honor winner accredited to it.

Speaker for the kick-off dinner will be Fred J. Milligan, Columbus attorney and trustee of The Ohio Historical Society, who has been appointed by Gov. James A. Rhodes as chairman of the Ohio Acre at Valley Forge committee.

Attending the dinner, which will be open to the public, will be other members of the Governor's committee. These include Don Weaver, vice-president of the Ohio Historical Society and former editor of the Columbus Citizen-Journal; Harry Richter, treasurer of the Historical Society and vice-president of the Ohio National Bank; and Lt. Col. William Haynes, secretary of the Historical Society.

Arrangements for the kick-off dinner and the start of the state-wide project were made at a meeting held yesterday afternoon at the Kenton Area Chamber of Commerce office. Attending the meet-were Milligan, Ora A. Winzenried, Chamber president, and representatives of local veterans organizations.

Milligan said that the aim of the Ohio Acre Committee is to encourage donations of \$1 each from persons wishing to contribute, rather than getting large donations from just a few persons or firms. In this way, he said, it makes the Ohio Acre a citizens project and gives more people the opportunity to participate.

Milligan also said that the names and addreses of all contributors to the Ohio Acre will be listed in the Henry Knox building on the Ohio Acre at Valley Forge along with detailed information of all Ohio Medal of Honor winners.

Ohio has had 200 Medal of Honor winners and is one of the leading states in the number of men receiving the nation's highest and most coveted military award. Names of these winners will also be engraved on a monument type shaft which will be a highlight of the Ohio Acre at Valley Forge.

Milligan told the committee that Ohio will have the honor of having the first acre in the Honor Grove at Valley Forge to be dedicated since the first Medal of Honor winner was Jacob Parrott of Ken-

He said that dedication ceremonies for the Ohio Acre at Valley Forge are set for May 30, 1968. Attending the dedication ceremonies will be Gov. Rhodes, living Medal of Honor winners, Ohio's Acre committee members and interested per-

The 50 one-acre plots at Valley Forge are arranged in a manner that each state's plot is located similar to its geographic location in the United States.

Sinec Kenton was the home of Jacob Parrott, the Ohio's Acre committee also felt that Kenton was the logical city to have the honor of inaugurating the statewide drive, Milligan stated.

Kenton was also the home of another man who received the Congressional Medal of Honor for heriosm in the Civil War. He was Delano Morey, grandfather of Leroy Hoppe, former mayor of Ken-

Envelopes are now being printed in which persons can make their \$1 donations to Ohio's acre. Space will be provided on the envelopes for persons to write their name and address and a receipt will be sent to every contributor, Milligan said.

He emphasized that there will be no overhead costs in the fund-drive as all the work is being done on a voluntary basis and every penny contributed will go for the development of Ohio's Acre.

At the meeting held yesterday, Jack O. Hicks, was selected as county representative of the Governor's Committee for Ohio's Acre at Valley Forge.

Hicks is state commander of the Disabled American Veterans organization and is a member of the Hardin County Chapter of the D.A.V.

Winzenried said that the Kenton Area Chamber of Commerce is pleased to spearhead the local kick-off project along with the various veterans and patriotic organizations.

He said that this is an opportunity for Hardin county to set the pace for Ohio in this important project to honor America's military heroes and urges persons to attend the kick-off dinner.

Tickets are \$2.50 each are on sale at the Chamber office at 210 E. Franklin St.


A Report From Your National Publicity Director

MAKE YOUR PLANS NOW TO ATTEND THE ANNUAL REUNION

Twenty-three years ago he sent me out on a listening post. I was a scared 19-year-old kid and I sat there all night, shivering, listening to the gluturral talk of the Krauts and suffering mosquito bites. The Krauts were across the road, behind the next hedgerow.

The next morning when I reported, he gave me hell for not being around when he wanted me for some scouting duty. This was Capt. George Partanen as I first knew him, C.O. of B Co., 330th Inf.

Later on, still in France I was scouting a way across a swampy area when I was hit in the shoulder by a sniper's bullet and when I came to Capt. Partanen was pulling me out of a small creek where I had fallen into head first after being hit. He dragged me to cover and asked me if I was able to get back to the rear alone and I said I could make it okay.

I was evacuated and the next time I saw Capt. Partanen was when he was being evacuated from the Hurtgen Forest, De. 4, 1944. I had rejoined the company after a stay in the hospital and we were moving up to replace elements of the badly shot up 4th Inf. Division. Capt. Partanen had been hit by mortar shell fragments while on reconaissance of the 4th's positions.

Today, almost 23 years later I saw Capt. Partanen again at L'Anse, Michigan. He is not so stern and militaristic like he was then. Age has mellowed him and he has a nice wife and family and I do too. We talked and hashed over old times. Underneath there was the nostalgia; we were still soldiers at heart. We're still in the good old 83rd, "B" Co. in fact. We left something "over there", part of us will never return; we felt it in our hearts as we talked, it sure was nice to see an "old buddy" again.

I would like to hear from some of my other buddies from B Co., 330th Infantry.


